Geographically situated in the southeast of the country, the third largest province of Pakistan by area, Sindh is also locally known as the Mehran.




Sindh

Bordered by the province Balochistan to the west Sindh is the Second largest province by population after Punjab to it's north, Sindh also borders the Indian states of Gujarat and Rajasthan to the east, and Arabian Sea to the south.

Sindh's landscape consists mostly of alluvial plains flanking the Indus River, the Thar desert in the eastern portion of the province closest to the border with India, and the Kirthar Mountains in the western part of Sindh. Sindh's climate is noted for hot summers and mild winters.

Having Pakistan's second largest economy, Sindh is home to a large portion of Pakistan's industrial sector, and the center of Pakistan's pharmaceutical industry. Sindh contains two of Pakistan's commercial seaports Port Bin Qasim and the Port of Karachi. The remainder of Sindh has an agriculture-based economy, and produces fruit and vegetables for consumption other parts of the country.



Education is the pivotal element to eliminate retardation from any society. To get the less privileged children educated, Pakistan Ranger Sindh realized the importance of education and hence worked towards embellishing the schools in interior Sindh, in addition to Karachi.

With a literacy rate close to zero percent in the surrounding areas, most of these zones are deprived of facilities like roads, electricity and quality health care. Minimal resources, unavailability of trained teachers, troops were educated who got deputed as teachers.



Welcoming rate towards education wasn't much in the beginning and very few children got themselves enrolled. The trained, deputed teachers played an important role in motivating and convincing the parents of local children, and inspired them to bring their children to these schools so that they can not only develop a better future for themselves, but become a functional part of Pakistan's workforce.

Children of these rural areas are educated for the latest trend and technologies, so they could open their vision and acquire knowledge about the most recent happenings. In addition to availing quality education, these children get to have free books and scholarships.


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Guarding the borders of Pakistan since the beginning, looking after it's people and providing their assistance wherever required, it wasn't very hard for Pakistan Rangers Sindh to identify the education gap between cities and remote rural areas.



Starting with schools near to their posts, they started teaching the young kids of less privileged remote areas from 2015. The initiative moved on to getting local teachers trained, and establishing welfare schools, providing free education with books, uniform and shoes, as well as providing lunch to the little angels. No additional funds are granted to them in this regard and these places are run by the existing workforce, with out any additional dedicated deployments.

The kids being born in the remote areas sustain themselves in a very tough environment where electricity and water aren't life needs, but considered as luxuries. This once when some of the kids were taken out from their village for a field trip, they got afraid and shocked by seeing a water pond, as they hadn't seen water in so much abundance their entire fledgling lives.



Bringing education to these children is a great initiative by Pakistan Rangers Sindh as Pakistan is in desperate need of talented, well equipped workforce who could participate to it's betterment and growth. While they start receiving their basic education in their native locations, the bright and talented ones get shifted to city schools with boarding and messing facilities, so they little genius minds may grow in a much better environment for not only their prosperity, but the nation's in whole.

A few old shut down schools got reopened, renovations performed where needed, while many got constructed new.

Thar

Being the seventh largest desert in the world and the third largest in Asia, the Thar Desert spans over an area of 175,000 square kilometers, where about 85% of the Thar Desert is in India, and the remaining part is in Pakistan.

It covers a large area of Pakistan as well as India, and extends between the Aravalli Hills in the north-east, the Great Rann of Kutch along the coast and the alluvial plains of the Indus River in the west and north-west.

Most of the desert is covered by huge shifting sand dunes that receive sediments from the alluvial plains and the coast. The sand is highly mobile due to strong winds occurring before the onset of the monsoon. The Luni River is the only river integrated into the desert. Rainfall is limited to 100–500 mm (3.9–19.7 in) per year, mostly falling from July to September.

To further aid the children of surrounding areas, who wish to learn but can't visit school daily due to the distance they are to cover, mostly on foot, a hostel is constructed, with 3 good sized rooms, adjacent veranda, a kitchen and 2 bathrooms.

UNESCO emphasizes how even a basic level of education helps improve productivity. It compares data from Pakistan and Vietnam to illustrate the importance of ensuring equal access to education. In 2005, the average amount of time spent at school by adults in both countries was similar (4.5 years in Pakistan and 4.9 years in Vietnam). However, the number of years spent in school by different types of people varies greatly in Pakistan compared with Vietnam. This difference in education inequality is cited as a major factor for stark differences in per capita growth in the two countries between 2005 and 2010. Vietnam's per capita income was 40 per cent less than that of Pakistan during the 1990s, but it became 20 per cent higher by 2010.

Pakistan is listed amongst 21 countries in Unesco's 11th EFA monitoring report.



Qasim

710 CE, at the borders of Sindh, an advance guard and six thousand camel riders from the governor of Makran transferred directly to Debal by sea along with five catapults. The army that eventually captured Sindh, later swelled by the Gurjars and Meds as well as other irregulars that heard of successes in Sindh.

When Muhammad bin Qasim passed through Makran while raising forces, he had to re-subdue the restive Umayyad towns of Fannazbur and Arman Belah (Lasbela) The first town assaulted was Debal. Qasim exacted a bloody retribution on Debal by giving no quarter to its residents or priests and destroying its great temple.

The legacy of upholding the prosperity of Sindh is being carried forward by Qasim Rangers, who keep a watch over a population of 15 million, spread across 253 Goths spanning over an area of 204km.

Sindh Rangers Sehwan Community Centre Jamshoro started of as primary level school in April 2011, which was later on upgraded to Secondary level in 2015. The well-renovated building with furnished class rooms stands to educate students approaching the count of 450.

The school has facilities like; well equipped science and computer laboratories, library with latest edition of leading Textbooks. A Sports ground with swings for extra-curricular activities, along with provision for free uniform / shoes as well as books & stationary.




Along with ancient Egypt and Mesopotamia, the most widespread one of three early civilizations of the Old World, the Indus Valley Civilization was a Bronze Age civilization (3300–1300 BCE; mature period 2600–1900 BCE).

Geographically placed in the northwestern regions of South Asia, extending from what today is northeast Afghanistan to Pakistan and northwest India.

The civilization flourished in the basins of the Indus River, which flows through the length of Pakistan, and along a system of perennial, mostly monsoon-fed rivers that once coursed in the vicinity of the seasonal Ghaggar-Hakra river in northwest India and eastern Pakistan.

Inhabitants of the ancient Indus river valley developed new techniques in handicraft and metallurgy. The Indus cities are noted for their urban planning, baked brick houses, elaborate drainage systems, water supply systems, and clusters of large non-residential buildings.


This historic area is under the vigilant supervision of Indus Rangers. Spreading over 162km, consisting of 61 Goths, having population reaching up to 5 million.



Making his travels to Medina, Karbala and Mashhad, seeking spiritual guidance, popular as Lal Shahbaz Qalandar, Syed Mohammad Usman Marwandi was a 12th century Sufi who was born in Marwand (present day Afghanistan).

He was a contemporary of Syed Jalal-ud-din Bukhari of UchSharif. After travelling extensively in Punjab, Sindh, Ajmer and finally settled in Sehwan.

It is said that 17 leading tribes of Punjab accepted Islam at the hands of Baba Farid. Some of these tribes were Kharals, Dhudhyan, Tobian and also Wattoo, a Rajput tribe. Jalaluddin Bukhari converted the Soomros and Sammas of Sindh while Shahbaz Qalandar had a great following in Multan and Northern Sindh.

Initially deployed on anti dacoit duties, Shahbaz Rangers was raised in Oct 1988 in reverence to Hazrat Sakhi Lal Shahbaz Qalandar. Main body of HQ Shahbaz Rangers and its integral Wings was moved from respective locations to Khairpur, Skr and Nawab Shah.
